



Definitions:

FFTUSA - Fly Fishing Team USA

Angler - Person who is angling during a competitive event

Controller - Person who observes angler to ensure compliance to rules and regulations, measures fish as required

Leadership Committee - Decision and rule making body of the FFTUSA

Organizing Committee - subcommittee of the Leadership Committee consisting of three (3) members who have the responsibility to select regional organizers, review and approve events, and bring recommendations for Inter-regional and USFFC recommendation for approval by the Leadership Committee

USFFC - United States Fly Fishing Championship

WFFC- World Fly Fishing Championship

Team Captain - Non competing angler who is designated to lead the National Team and WFFC Team

National Team - Team selected at the end of each competition cycle to represent FFTUSA at the national level

Team Member(s) - Any angler that pays dues or participates in FFTUSA sponsored activities. This includes National Team members, WFFC Team members, Team Captain, and any persons on the Leadership Committee

WFFC Team - Team selected from the National Team members to represent the USA at the WFFC

Competition cycle - Angling event cycle that culminates with the USFFC and selection of the National Team and WFFC Team

Team Mission Statement

The mission of Fly Fishing Team USA (“FFTUSA”) is to educate and train men and women in the sport of competitive fly fishing on both national and international levels and to promote, and educate its members in the conservation of our fisheries, lakes, rivers and streams. The FFTUSA will select a team of qualified anglers to represent the United States of America at national and international fly fishing competitions, including the world fly fishing competition held each year by the International Sport Fly Fishing Federation (“FIPS-Mouche”) which is an arm of the International Angling Confederation (“CIPS”). The team selected by the FFTUSA will represent

the USA with honor and dignity and will display sportsmanship to Olympic standards with respect for their fellow members and competitors from around the world.

1. Code of Conduct

- 1.1. Membership with FFTUSA is a privilege
 - 1.1.1. All Team Members must agree to uphold the team mission statement and the code of conduct
- 1.2. While participating in any FFTUSA sanctioned activity or in those events where one is representing or could be perceived as representing FFTUSA, Team Members shall observe the following provisions:
 - 1.2.1. Team Members will respect other competitors, competition officials, volunteers, and the fishing public
 - 1.2.2. Team Members will use courtesy and good manners and refrain from the use of profane or abusive language
 - 1.2.3. Team Members will always conduct themselves as worthy representatives of the United States of America and shall maintain high standards of moral and ethical conduct
 - 1.2.4. Team Members will respect and care for the fish, rivers, lakes, and all facilities associated with a competition venue or event
 - 1.2.5. Team Members will abstain from illegal or immoderate use of alcohol and use of illegal or banned drugs
 - 1.2.6. Team Members agree to abide by anti-doping rules and procedures outlined by FIPS-Mouche in Article 40 of the official FIPS-Mouche Competition Rules
 - 1.2.7. No Team Members shall commit a criminal act
 - 1.2.8. Team Members are responsible for knowledge of and adherence to competition rules and procedures as outlined by FFTUSA, an agent of FFTUSA, and FIPS-Mouche
- 1.3. Failure to comply with the provisions in Item 1.2 may lead to disciplinary action by the Leadership Committee
 - 1.3.1. Disciplinary actions might include:
 - 1.3.1.1. Suspension from competition(s) without refund of entry fee
 - 1.3.1.2. Forfeiture of membership fee without refund
 - 1.3.1.3. Suspension or banning from becoming a Team Members
 - 1.3.1.4. Removal from the National Team or WFFC Team
 - 1.3.1.5. All rule violations must be reported to a member of the Leadership Committee as soon as possible on the day of the alleged violation
- 1.4. Infractions that are related to competitions will have a two (2) placing point penalty given at the end of any competition for the following:
 - 1.4.1. Fishing in the wrong beat/boat or with the wrong angler in a boat
 - 1.4.1.1. This only affects the angler(s) causing the infraction, not the angler(s) affected by the offending angler(s)
 - 1.4.2. Angling in water closed to fishing prior to or during the competition
 - 1.4.3. Angler allows a controller to "pocket control" or cross the river when not allowed
 - 1.4.4. Disrespecting another competitor, controller or official
 - 1.4.5. An angler being assisted by another person who acts on their behalf while waters are closed or during a competition (Examples of this are, gaining information from another person that fishes closed or competition waters, getting information from a person that

- 3.1.3. In order for events to count towards making the National Team they must be sanctioned by FFTUSA
- 3.1.4. All events will utilize the www.flycomps.com website for registration and information distribution of events
- 3.1.5. Point Accumulation
 - 3.1.5.1. Over the course of the competitive cycle, anglers will accumulate points by participating in sanctioned competitions
 - 3.1.5.2. The accumulation of points is used to select anglers to be on the National Team and WFFC Team

4. Competition event structure and rules

- 4.1. In order to provide consistency and ease in organization of events, FFTUSA is adopting modification to standard FIPS Mouche rules as noted below
- 4.2. FFTUSA will no longer supply measuring trays for events
 - 4.2.1. Each angler wishing to participate in FFTUSA events that require the measurement of fish shall be required to purchase a FFTUSA sanctioned measuring tray from FFTUSA or affiliated partner and bring this measuring tray to events that require the measurement of fish
- 4.3. No measure protocol
 - 4.3.1. As defined below or as approved by the Leadership Committee , some events may be set up to only count the number of fish, not the length of each fish
 - 4.3.2. Once a fish has been verified by the controller to be fair caught, the fish is recorded
 - 4.3.3. The organizer may set a minimum fish size by providing each angler with a net measuring device, such as a brightly colored zip tie that can be seen from a distance, so that the controller and angler can verify that the fish meets a minimum size prior to counting
- 4.4. All events will be angler controlled
 - 4.4.1. Controllers should be able to verify that each fish is caught fairly
 - 4.4.1.1. The controller will give verbal agreement that the fish has been fairly caught
 - 4.4.2. Once verified that the fish is fairly caught the angler may remove the fly
 - 4.4.3. If needed, the fish shall be placed in the measuring trough and the angler and controller will verify the length of the fish
 - 4.4.4. Once agreed the controller will record the fish and the angler will initial
- 4.5. Angler controlled rules for loch style venues
 - 4.5.1.1. The controlled draw will assign a pair of anglers for each boat
 - 4.5.1.2. Anglers will control each other
 - 4.5.1.3. No fishing until both are ready to fish when resetting drifts or controlling the boat
 - 4.5.1.4. No modification of the line, leader, or flies while the other angler is moving the boat or making adjustments to the boat such as setting the drogue
- 4.6. Angler controlled rules for lake bank style venues
 - 4.6.1.1. It is strongly suggested that there be a designated rotation implemented for bank sessions (For example, every hour there is a 10 minute pause to fishing to allow all anglers to shift 2 beats up)
 - 4.6.1.2. If there are no available anglers to control, adjacent anglers should control each other (Angler 1 & 2, 3 & 4 etc...)
 - 4.6.1.2.1. After landing a fish, the angler must approach the side of the beat of the controller to provide visibility to the controller
- 4.7. Angler controlled rules for river venues

- 4.7.1.1. The controlled draw will ensure that once a beat has been fished or controlled by any team, no other person on that team will be able to fish that same beat
- 4.7.1.2. An angler shall not fish the same beat that said angler controlled previously
- 4.7.1.3. The angler should control the same beat that the angler fished previously
- 4.7.1.4. In competitions where fish will be measured, controllers are not allowed to leave the immediate proximity of the bank (i.e. they are not allowed to follow the angler across the river or come to the angler to measure a fish in the river)
- 4.7.1.5. Controllers must follow appropriate etiquette and anglers instructions in order to not disturb fishing opportunities

4.8. Other rules

- 4.8.1. There shall be no photography or video recordings taken by controllers except as follows
 - 4.8.1.1. Requested by the angler to document any challenges to a controller ruling
 - 4.8.1.2. Capture a photo of the angler or a fish to share later
- 4.8.2. There shall be no communication by the angler or the controller (Text, email, phone, snapchat, etc...) during sessions with team mates, other anglers or their agents
- 4.8.3. Session lengths, rest time between sessions, and requirements related to controlling can be amended to account for special conditions, seasonal needs or travel requirements
 - 4.8.3.1. Deviations to these rules may be implemented if approved by the regional coordinator for regional events and the Leadership Committee for interregional events
- 4.8.4. All events will follow FIPS Mouche rules regarding event tactics and equipment except where approved by the event organizer and the Leadership Committee

5. Regionally focused organization

- 5.1. For purposes of encouraging event organization and reducing the overall cost the anglers, the USA will be divided up into four regions
 - 5.1.1. Each region will have a designated regional coordinator(s)
 - 5.1.1.1. This coordinator will be approved by the Organizing Committee
 - 5.1.1.2. The coordinator will be responsible for event organization in the region including the following activities:
 - 5.1.1.2.1. Facilitate the submission and approval of events
 - 5.1.1.2.2. Ensure that enough events are hosted in the region
 - 5.1.1.2.3. Manage the point accumulation and ranking of anglers in the respective region
 - 5.1.2. Anglers should reside in the region where they compete at the regional level
 - 5.1.3. Northeast Region
 - 5.1.3.1. Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Indiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Maryland, Michigan, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Wisconsin, Washington DC
 - 5.1.4. Southeast Region
 - 5.1.4.1. Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia
 - 5.1.5. West Region
 - 5.1.5.1. Alaska, Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington
 - 5.1.6. Midwest Region
 - 5.1.6.1. Arkansas, Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, Wyoming

- 5.1.7. Anglers that relocate their place of residence within a cycle may carry their regional scores from their prior region to the new region
- 5.1.8. Anglers may petition to participate in another region based on their specific location being more proximate to another region (For example Jackson Hole Wyoming, is more closely associated with Idaho and Utah in the West region than the other parts of Wyoming and Colorado that are in the Midwest region)
 - 5.1.8.1. Anglers must make this choice for the duration of the cycle
 - 5.1.8.2. Request must be approved by the affected regional coordinators
 - 5.1.8.2.1. Disputes will be settled by the Organizing Committee

6. Regional events

- 6.1. The goal of regional events is to identify the top anglers in each region
- 6.2. Regional season
 - 6.2.1. The season for point accrual from regional events should begin on August 1st of the event cycle and end on July 31st, two years later
 - 6.2.1.1. Variances must be approved by the Leadership Committee
- 6.3. Sanctioning of events (process and timeline)
 - 6.3.1. The organizer should work with the regional coordinator to submit the event application no less than thirty (30) days in advance of the event
 - 6.3.2. The regional coordinator is responsible for approving regional events
 - 6.3.2.1. Once an application has been submitted, the regional coordinator will work with the organizer to approve or reject events within seven (7) days
 - 6.3.3. Events must be announced to Team Members no less than fourteen (14) days in advance of the event
- 6.4. Eligibility for regional events
 - 6.4.1. Any anglers not residing in the region will be subject to a twenty-four (24) hour registration delay and will not accrue points in the event. The angler's finish will be included in determining the placing for all other anglers
 - 6.4.2. Any anglers who are not eligible to make the National Team will be subject to a twenty-four (24) hour registration delay for all events
- 6.5. Event costs
 - 6.5.1. Organizers are responsible for preparing for the event and any associated costs
 - 6.5.1.1. Event specific costs that require additional funding such as supplies, boat rentals or private water fishing fees, permitting fees, etc... should be incurred directly by the event participants or paid to the event organizer
 - 6.5.1.2. FFTUSA can supply drogues for each region to be use in loch style events
- 6.6. Regional event structure
 - 6.6.1. One (1) day events
 - 6.6.2. Two (2) angling sessions per angler
 - 6.6.3. A minimum of eight (8) anglers
 - 6.6.4. Anglers should self organize or be assigned by the organizer into teams of two anglers for the event
 - 6.6.5. No measure protocol should be used
 - 6.6.6. Sessions shall be a minimum of one and a half (1.5) hours in length
 - 6.6.7. There shall be a minimum of one half (0.5) hours of rest between sessions
 - 6.6.8. Event finishes count towards an angler's ranking
- 6.7. Regional points accrual
 - 6.7.1. Only anglers living in or associated with a region will accumulate points towards their ranking in that region

- 6.7.2. Points shall be awarded based on an anglers finish at regional events
 - 6.7.2.1. At the beginning of the cycle the regional coordinator for each region shall set the maximum number of points available for events during the cycle in their region
 - 6.7.2.1.1. This number shall not be changed during the cycle unless approved by the Leadership Committee
 - 6.7.2.1.2. This should be based on reasonable and expected level of participation at all events in each region (For example, a region that can regularly support events that have sixteen (16) anglers can set the maximum points awarded per event to sixteen (16))
 - 6.7.2.2. The number of points awarded at any event shall be equal to the number of anglers registered for the event up to the maximum set by the regional coordinator
 - 6.7.2.2.1. If anglers drop out within five (5) days of the event the number of points awarded for the event shall not be changed
 - 6.7.2.3. The first place finisher in regional events will be awarded the maximum number of points with each subsequent finisher receiving one point less
 - 6.7.2.4. The minimum number of points awarded will be one (1) point
 - 6.7.2.5. In a situation where an angler(s) blanks all sessions that angler(s) shall receive the minimum number of points for the event
 - 6.7.2.6. Flycomps.com will account for tie scores at an event
- 6.8. Number of events in a region
 - 6.8.1. There is no limit on the number of events that can be hosted within a region
 - 6.8.1.1. The regional coordinator should use discretion when approving events so as not to allow for isolated groups of anglers to accumulate points in absence of the majority of anglers in a region
 - 6.8.2. A maximum of five (5) regional events will be counted towards an angler's total points within the region
- 6.9. Regional ranking
 - 6.9.1. At the end of the regional season anglers in each region will be ranked according to the number of points earned during the cycle
 - 6.9.1.1. The angler with the most points will receive a ranking of one (1)
 - 6.9.1.2. The next highest point earning angler a ranking of two (2) and so on
 - 6.9.1.3. In the case of ties the angler with the fewest events shall hold the tie breaking advantage
 - 6.9.1.4. Additional ties shall share placings
- 6.10. Regional ranking points
 - 6.10.1. Regional rankings will be converted to regional points for the purpose of the final rankings by giving twenty (20) points to the highest ranked angler and one less for each subsequent angler
 - 6.10.2. Anglers with a rank of twenty (20) or more in each region will receive 1 regional ranking point

7. Interregional events

- 7.1. The goal of interregional events is to identify the top anglers in the country that will qualify for the USFFC
- 7.2. Only anglers that are eligible to make the National Team are eligible to participate in interregional events
- 7.3. Interregional season

- 7.3.1. The season for point accrual from regional events should start on August 1st in the second year of the cycle and end between October 1st and January 31st of the following year, depending on timing of the USFFC
 - 7.3.1.1. Variances must be approved by the Leadership Committee
- 7.4. Sanctioning of events
 - 7.4.1. The Organizing Committee will direct the organization of interregional events
 - 7.4.2. There should be a total of six (6) events
 - 7.4.2.1. There should be one (1) within each region, four (4) total
 - 7.4.2.2. There should be two (2) bonus events selected by the Leadership Committee
- 7.5. Structure of interregional events
 - 7.5.1. All interregional events will be two (2) or three (3) day, four (4) session events
 - 7.5.2. All events should consist of a mix of river and lake based venues
 - 7.5.2.1. Variations shall be approved by the Leadership Committee
 - 7.5.3. A minimum of twenty four (24) anglers
 - 7.5.4. Maximum of thirty two (32) anglers
 - 7.5.5. Sessions shall be a minimum of two (2.0) hours in length
 - 7.5.6. There shall be a minimum of one half (0.5) hours of rest between sessions
 - 7.5.7. There is a team component for these events and anglers should align themselves into teams
 - 7.5.7.1. It is desirable that these teams be region based
 - 7.5.7.2. In the case that teams need to be assigned, the organizer and Team Captain will be responsible for this
- 7.6. Scheduling of interregional events
 - 7.6.1. The Organizing Committee should announce dates and locations for all interregional events at the opening of the interregional portion of the competition cycle
 - 7.6.2. Events should be planned such that there are reasonable periods of time between events so as to allow the majority of anglers to participate (For example, not closer than three week apart and avoiding other events, such as the world championship events)
- 7.7. Eligibility for interregional events
 - 7.7.1. Interregional events are invitation only events based on angler's rankings within their respective regions
 - 7.7.1.1. Organizing Committee will communicate details of the invitation process including details such as length of time each angler has to select their events
 - 7.7.2. No angler can participate in more than four (4) interregional events
 - 7.7.3. Invitation order until all events are full
 - 7.7.3.1. In all cases the region with the highest number of anglers shall select first and the fewest last
 - 7.7.3.2. The top four (4) ranked anglers in each region will be invited to select the interregional events that they want to participate in (sixteen (16) anglers)
 - 7.7.3.3. WFFC Team members that have competed or been the designated alternate during the cycle
 - 7.7.3.4. Next highest ranked anglers in each region until interregional events are full
 - 7.7.3.5. National Team exception
 - 7.7.3.5.1. Current National Team members that are not ranked high enough to select competitions in the normal process will be last to fill any open registration spots at competitions
 - 7.7.3.5.1.1. They will be guaranteed a spot to fish at least the number of interregionals that count towards their score

- 7.7.4. Eligible anglers shall declare the events that they choose to participate in
- 7.7.5. The Organizing Committee shall notify each angler with a confirmation of the events that were selected by the angler
- 7.7.6. As event details are confirmed the organizer shall set up the event in www.flycomps.com and each eligible angler shall register for the specific events that they are confirmed for
- 7.7.7. If anglers drop out and create open spots in any interregional event the following protocol for filling the spots shall be observed
 - 7.7.7.1. Next highest angler in each region
 - 7.7.7.2. Open spots at events within 30 days of the event can be filled by Team Member anglers in the host region after offering it first to other higher ranked anglers
- 7.8. Interregional cost structure
 - 7.8.1. Interregionals shall have a cost to participants of \$125 for registration
 - 7.8.1.1. Variances to this cost structure must be approved by the Organizing Committee
 - 7.8.1.2. Additional fees for boat rentals etc. can be added to the base registration cost
- 7.9. Inter-regional points accrual
 - 7.9.1. Points shall be awarded based on an anglers finish
 - 7.9.2. The first place finisher will be awarded twenty four (24) points with each subsequent finisher receiving one point less
 - 7.9.3. Any anglers placing in positions twenty four (24) and higher will receive one (1) point
 - 7.9.4. A maximum of three (3) interregional events will be counted towards an angler's total points.
- 7.10. Post interregional score
 - 7.10.1. At the end of the interregional cycle, anglers total points will be summarized based on the number of points earned during the interregional cycle and their regional ranking points
 - 7.10.2. In the case of ties, the angler with the highest regional ranking points will hold the tie breaking advantage
 - 7.10.3. Additional ties shall share placings
- 7.11. WFFC Team accommodation
 - 7.11.1. Members of the WFFC Team including the designated alternate may elect to use their team score at the WFFC as a substitute for one interregional score
 - 7.11.1.1. A maximum of twenty four (24) points can be used for a first place finish at the WFFC with one point less being awarded for each subsequent place finish

8. USFFC

- 8.1. The goal of the USFFC is to identify the top anglers in the nation
- 8.2. Only anglers that are eligible to make the National Team are eligible to participate in the USFFC
- 8.3. USFFC will be held in between October 1st and May 31st at the end of the cycle calendar
- 8.4. Sanctioning of events
 - 8.4.1. The Leadership Committee will be responsible for the organization of these events
 - 8.4.2. Events must be announced to Team Members no less than ninety (90) days in advance of the event
- 8.5. Eligibility for USFFC
 - 8.5.1. USFFC is an invitation only event
 - 8.5.2. Invitation to the event will be based on anglers post interregional score
 - 8.5.2.1. Anglers with the highest score will be invited first
 - 8.5.3. All current National Team members will be invited to participate
- 8.6. Organization of USFFC
 - 8.6.1. Approximately forty (40) anglers will be invited

- 8.6.1.1. Adjusted based on event location and available venues
- 8.6.2. USFFC will be at least a five session event over at least three (3) days
- 8.6.3. Sessions shall be a minimum of 2.0 hours in length
- 8.6.4. There shall be a minimum of 0.5 hours of rest between sessions
- 8.6.5. There is a team component for these events and anglers should align themselves into teams
 - 8.6.5.1. In the case that teams need to be assigned the organizer and Team Captain will be responsible for this
- 8.6.6. USFFC points accrual
 - 8.6.6.1. Points shall be awarded based on an angler's finish
 - 8.6.6.2. The first place finisher will be awarded forty (40) points with each subsequent finisher receiving one point less
 - 8.6.6.3. Any anglers placing in positions forty (40) and higher will receive one (1) point

9. Final end of cycle ranking

- 9.1. At the end of the USFFC, anglers will be ranked according to the sum of points earned at the USFFC, qualifying interregionals, and regional ranking points
 - 9.1.1. In the case of ties, the angler with higher USFFC points will be ranked higher

10. FFTUSA National Team Members

- 10.1. At the close of each USFFC, a team of fifteen (15) anglers will be selected to represent FFTUSA during the next cycle
 - 10.1.1. This selection will happen before the closing ceremony at the USFFC and will be announced at the closing ceremony
- 10.2. The top fifteen (15) eligible anglers by rank will be selected to be on the National Team
 - 10.2.1. Anglers must have fished in the USFFC to be eligible
 - 10.2.2. If an angler is unable to or unwilling to be selected to the National Team, the angler with the next highest points will be selected
- 10.3. To maintain eligibility as a National Team member each angler must adhere to the following requirements:
 - 10.3.1. Follow the FFTUSA code of conduct
 - 10.3.2. Fish in at least three (3) competitions per year (regional, interregional, WFFC)
 - 10.3.3. Materially participate in the organization of one (1) regional during each cycle
 - 10.3.3.1. If not the primary organizer of a competition, a National Team member should be the main consultant for the organizer and should assist by setting beats, recruiting volunteers or boats, obtaining permits, training volunteers, or other activities as needed for competition organization and execution
- 10.4. If during the course of the cycle, a National Team member does not meet the minimum requirements stated in section 10.3 or is no longer willing or able to commit to participate on the team, that angler's position on the team will be evaluated by the Leadership Committee , and that angler may be dismissed from the team following a vote by the non-competing members of the Leadership Committee
 - 10.4.1. The following criteria will be used to select a replacement if a Team Member is dismissed from the team:
 - 10.4.1.1. The angler with the highest point total, as calculated by adding the points from the previous cycle and the points accumulated during the current cycle, will be selected to be a National Team member
- 10.5. If a National Team member is unable to participate in the USFFC, at the discretion of the Team Captain, the highest ranked angler(s) outside of the current National Team will be invited to be on one of more of the FFTUSA teams

11. World Fly Fishing Championship Team Selection

- 11.1. At the close of each USFFC, a group of eight (8) anglers will be selected from the group of fifteen (15) National Team members that will represent FFTUSA at the WFFC
 - 11.1.1. This selection will happen before the closing ceremony at the USFFC and will be announced at the closing ceremony
 - 11.1.2. The top three (3) Team Members in total points at the end of the competition cycle will automatically be selected for the WFFC Team
 - 11.1.3. The fourth (4th) through eighth (8th) anglers will be selected by the Team Captain
- 11.2. From the eight (8) anglers selected, the Team Captain will choose six (6) anglers that will attend the WFFC with sufficient time to allow anglers to prepare for the WFFC in a timely manner
 - 11.2.1. The Team Captain will designate the alternate for the WFFC before the WFFC Team leaves for the WFFC
- 11.3. In cycles where there are multiple WFFCs, the Team Captain may select a different set of anglers from the WFFC Team to represent FFTUSA at the WFFC
- 11.4. If any of the WFFC Team members are not able to participate, the Team Captain may select additional anglers as needed from the National Team
- 11.5. If a WFFC Team member does not meet the code of conduct he or she will be subject to removal by the majority vote of the non-competing members of the Leadership Committee (see Code of Conduct section 1)

12. Team Captain Selection

- 12.1. A vote for a Team Captain will only occur if the current Team Captain resigns or if the Leadership Committee determines a vote for a new Team Captain needs to occur
- 12.2. The Team Captain can be nominated by any Team Member or the Leadership Committee
 - 12.2.1. The Team Captain should have competition experience, but will not be currently competing to make the National Team
- 12.3. The Team Captain will then be selected from the list of nominees by a confidential vote by the members of the Leadership Committee
 - 12.3.1. The Leadership Committee will determine the method of voting
- 12.4. Nominated individuals will not be allowed to vote
- 12.5. The Team Captain will never see who voted for whom
- 12.6. The vote for the Team Captain will be done before the USFFC, unless extenuating circumstances prevent this from happening
- 12.7. If the Team Captain cannot fulfill responsibilities at a WFFC the Leadership Committee will appoint a temporary captain to fulfill that role as it relates to the WFFC
